SUSTAINABLE RHYTHM

O nce, there were two superb timber loggers. To determine who was the better logger, they decided to have a competition. The one who cuts down the greatest number of trees from sunrise to sundown would be the winner.

At the first light of day, they lifted their polished axes and skilfully began to chop at their first trees. Both kept close timing with each other. Each logger would shout "TIMBER!" as a final stroke of his axe brought a tree down. By mid-morning the young logger was leading far ahead. As the crowd roared with their cheers, adrenaline rushed through the voung logger, driving him to log even faster. Meanwhile, the older logger trailed behind. His pace seemed almost leisurely in comparison, as he took time to grind his axe after felling every tree.

At mid-day, the young logger began to show signs of slowing down - his axe had become less effective. Still, he pushed on relentlessly. The older logger maintained his rhythm – felling one tree, sharpening his axe, felling one tree, sharpening his axe.



It was now late in the afternoon, the young logger could no longer cut even a single tree, while the older logger steadily soldiered on. By the last light of day, the older logger had chopped down every single tree in his path – he had emerged the stronger logger and was the winner!

It is not difficult for us to realize what the winning factor was – the older logger took time to sharpen his axe. But how often, like the young logger, we fall into the trap to push on with our blunt axes.

As I write this article, I am mindful that I don't always live out the much-needed tempo that I (and the young logger) so desperately need. Living a hectic city life; shouldering countless responsibilities; managing multiple projects along the same deadlines...sounds familiar? That's my life too. I am convinced that all Officers and teachers similarly need a rhythm in their lives. As BB Officers, we wear many hats. We juggle work, ministry, family and other personal commitments. We run camps and host myriad BB activities to give our Boys an enriching experience. By the same token, are we fulfilled? Or are our palpitating hearts crying out that we need a sensible pace, a breathing space?

The irony is, we often get so caught up with ministry that we have no time to care for ourselves. **Sharpening our axes begins** with self-care. Perhaps we need to start by re-calibrating our understanding: self-care **is not** self-centredness. Self-care is what we deliberately do to take care of our personal mental, emotional, physical and for us believers, spiritual health.

Just as we tend to leave the house with a convenient piece of bread, we often hustle into our over-scheduled days with a perfunctory reading of a verse. Let's not forget that Jesus needed to take solitude time with His Father, to sharpen His axe. By spending unhurried, alone time to speak to God about our lives, our feelings, we are inviting Him in turn, to reveal Himself, His encouragement, His plans, and inevitably, to fill us. This precious uninterrupted time sharpens our axes.



There once lived a baker extraordinaire in a small town. Every morning the townsfolk would be awakened from their sleep by the aromatic breads hot out from his oven. Long queues would snake across the streets even before the bakery opened, and these freshly baked loaves would feed all the families in that town. By noon, the breads would sell out and the baker would start his preparation for the next day's bake, working



Perhaps to some, our busy-ness is formed by a falsehood - if we slack off, we do injustice to those under our charge. Guilt plagues us, and guilt is corrosive and draining. It leaves us exhausted and depleted. late into the night. That formed his routine every day, week, and month; this went on for a few years. The residents soon noticed that the baker was gradually getting thinner. He finally collapsed one day and neighbours found him in his home, very ill. He was severely fatigued and highly malnourished. While the baker strived to feed the town, he forgot to feed himself.

What hobbies or activities did you used to enjoy? Was there someplace you had thought of visiting? What about going back to those books that are neither management nor self-help? Today, would you indulge in a simple walk to enjoy God's creation - to be amazed by cloud formations or just to smell the flowers?

My fellow brothers and sisters, my earnest prayer for all is that we would serve God in a **rested** posture. That would ultimately be most satisfying to us, most glorifying to Him, and most effective in our outreach.
