Staying True in Changing Times

Can you name a famous corporation from the year 1930?



In the United States, millionaire Andrew Carnegie's U.S. Steel was an industrial giant, dominating global markets. It supplied steel for iconic structures like the Empire State Building and was a symbol of American economic might. Yet, in June 2025, 95 years later, President Donald Trump approved the sale of U.S. Steel to Nippon Steel, a Japanese company.

This moment marks more than just a business transaction. It's a reminder of how hard it is to stay the course and remain relevant, let alone do so for nearly a century.

Here in Singapore, The Boys' Brigade, founded in 1930, has not only remained relevant but has stayed true to its *Object* over the past 95 years. For us as young BB leaders, this is more important than ever in the complex world we live in.

So, how can we continue to live out the *BB Object—Obedience, Reverence, Discipline, and Self-respect*—in today's world? Here are three thoughts:

1. Remain Rooted



We must be rooted in our BB values, not just during parades or camps, but in our everyday lives. Take *obedience*, for example. It's not about blindly following orders, but honouring those placed in our lives, especially our parents, through our actions, words, and decisions.

2. Remain Polite



Politeness is an expression of *reverence*. Even when we disagree with others, we can choose to respond with calm and respect. Emotional maturity means being composed under pressure, not always easy, but always worth striving for.

3. Remain Resolute



To be resolute is to live out *discipline* and *self-respect* in action. It means living with purpose and conviction, even when it's inconvenient or unpopular. We need mentors, Officers, and role models to guide us, people who show us what wise, value-driven decisions look like in real life.

As we live out these values, our character is formed and strengthened. May you find joy in the journey of growing into a man. And in doing so, may you stand ready for whatever challenges lie ahead—Sure & Stedfast.

A total of 64 Boys and 9 Primers from 19 Companies gathered at BB Headquarters for the highly anticipated drill contingent selection exercise for the National Day Parade (NDP) 2025. This marks the start of their journey toward representing the Brigade in the prestigious Parade and Ceremony segment on Singapore's birthday, 9 August.

The selection exercise was conducted under the keen eyes of trainers from the Republic of Singapore Air Force, who assessed the Boys' drill standards and guided them in refining their movements. Their professional input helped sharpen precision and discipline—key elements for any national parade.

The session was further uplifted by a visit from Parade Regimental Sergeant Major, MWO Lim Jie Hui, who took time to engage the Boys and offer motivating words of encouragement. His presence and support left a lasting impression on the participants as they prepare for the demanding weeks ahead.



Cluster Consultation Sessions

Across the months of April and May, BB Officers from across Singapore came together at BB Headquarters for a series of meaningful Cluster Consultation Sessions aimed at strengthening our shared mission.

Led by LTA Oliver Loke, Vice-President for Innovation and Learning, each session addressed current challenges faced by Companies and explored possibilities for future growth. He shared valuable insights and outlined the expectations for the year ahead, encouraging thoughtful reflection and active discussion.

Across the three sessions, a total of 83 Officers representing 76 Companies engaged in open dialogue, exchanged ideas, and found encouragement in one another's experiences. It was a fruitful time of connection and collaboration, reaffirming our shared commitment to the Boys' Brigade's values and purpose.

Together, we move forward with renewed vision, committed to building stronger Companies and making a lasting impact in the lives of our Boys.



Following the selection exercise, 45 Boys and 2 Primers from 16 Companies were selected and have been undergoing rigorous trainings to represent the Brigade at the National Day Parade (NDP).

Trainings began at Seletar Camp, where participants learned the expectations of national-level parade standards and interacted with other uniformed groups. These early sessions laid the foundation in discipline, drill precision, and teamwork.

Since June, the contingent has moved to weekly rehearsals at the Padang, where the actual Parade and Ceremony segment will be held. Every Saturday, the Boys have committed themselves to the demanding training sessions, rain or shine. Their hard work includes mastering drill movements, building coordination, and learning to perform as a cohesive unit. Each practice reflects the values of commitment, excellence, and perseverance.

The Boys' efforts have been supported by visits from members of the Brigade Executive, who offered encouragement and affirmed their progress. These visits have reminded the Boys of the greater purpose behind their participation — to represent not just their Companies, but the entire BB community with honour and pride.

As the Nation's 60th birthday approaches, these Boys continue to train with discipline and heart. Their journey stands as a powerful example of youth stepping up with courage and responsibility to serve on Singapore's biggest stage.

Emotional Intelligence in Leadership

Most of us in the BB would be familiar enough with our *Object*, and its desire for the promotion of *Obedience, Reverence, Discipline, Self-respect, and all that tends towards a true Christian Manliness*. Yet even after years in the BB, many of us would admit that we still have a long way to go in embodying these habits.

This is not the result of a lack of knowledge or teaching – we generally teach these things well. But knowledge alone is not enough to cultivate such habits. If that were the case, there would be no smokers left in the world, given the overwhelming consensus on the harmful effects of smoking. What is needed is not just a change of mind, but also a change of heart – and this is where our emotions come into play. Blaise Pascal once remarked, "The heart has its reasons that reason does not know."

Understanding our emotions will go a long way to helping what is in our head descend to our heart. Christians have understood this throughout history, but in recent times society has been catching up. The concept of "emotional intelligence" was coined to such an end, emphasising the importance of knowing not just the empirical world around us, but to also understand what is inside ourselves and those around us. This is not a passing fad, although many of the ways in which the world tries to address them will be. Understanding ourselves and our emotions are an essential part of growing in maturity, so important that it is almost assumed within Scripture to be a given.

Why are you cast down, O my soul, and why are you disquieted within me? Hope in God; for I shall again praise him, my help and my God.

(Psalm 42:5)

It's a rhetorical question, and yet the Psalmist could only come to this point by recognising a deep disquiet within. Recognising our emotions enables us to respond to the circumstances around us in constructive (and not destructive) ways. For the Psalmist in Ps 42, awareness of his inner sorrow drew the Psalmist closer towards God, awakening a deep yearning for God "as a deer pants for water".

In the same way, growing to understand our emotions, and that of others, enables us to rightly interpret and respond to the circumstances around us. That is what sets strong leaders apart from the mediocre. Strong leaders go beyond compelling people towards a certain end. Rather, strong leaders see beyond the surface, recognising the emotions that spurred a person's actions, even unveiling these motivations if they have been hidden. Strong leaders help others lead themselves, in other words.

My prayer is that we will grow to reflect the Kingdom of God by being a Brigade with a deeper awareness of our emotions, that our soul may prosper as we respond to the storms and joys of life.
